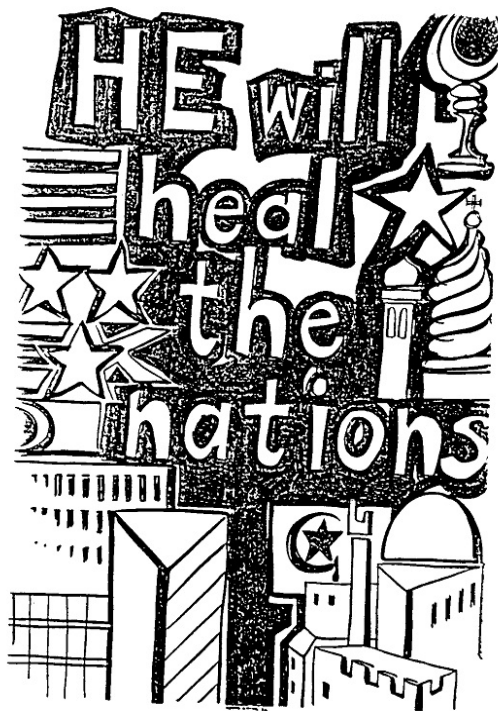
The Liturgy of the Eucharist

In his lecture Dr. Gearon will report on some initial findings from an AHRC funded project in Political Theology, interviewing senior religious leaders and authority figures in England.

Educating in Faith : Resources are now available to support the celebration of Catholic Education Week in schools and parishes from **Sunday 12th to Saturday 18th February 2012**.

The theme for Education Sunday this year is taken from the Rite of Baptism, the conclusion to which has given us the title of our new syllabus for religious education.

This year Education Week encompasses Sundays 6 and 7 of Year B and, by one of those wonderful coincidences so often experienced in the availability of gospel passages for liturgical use, the gospels for both Sundays explore faith from a different angle.

In the first, we encounter the faith of a leper who is prepared to take an extraordinary risk to gain access to Jesus, because he, the leper, believes that Jesus can make him clean. The experience of the leper opens up for us a consequence of faith in Jesus that is quite mind-blowing: we are given a glimpse of the effects of Jesus' death and resurrection, an instance of role reversal where Jesus 'changes places' with sinful & broken humanity, just as he changes places with the leper.

In the 2nd gospel, we hear of the faith of 4 men who are prepared to raise the roof of a house to gain access to Jesus for their paralysed friend. Again, those with faith gain more than they bargained for: the men's faith leads not only to the physical healing of their friend, but also in the gift for him of the forgiveness of his sins. The contrast here is with the lack of faith, not to mention the cynical rejection of Jesus by the scribes. The two reflections which are provided inside explore in depth the issues in the gospel passages to be read on these two Sundays. Hopefully they may prompt us to reflect on the extent of our own faith, assisting us to be proud to profess that faith in Christ Jesus Our Lord!

St Blaise: Patron saint of sufferers from throat diseases. One of the 'Fourteen Holy Helpers' St Blaise is believed to have been a fourth century bishop of Sebaste in Armenia. He was martyred around 316AD under the Emperor Licinius.

According to legends, during the persecutions he hid in a cave and blessed sick or wounded animals. One day a woman brought her son with a fishbone stuck in his throat and he cured him. When he was imprisoned, the same woman brought him candles and food. From this comes the tradition of blessing throats on this day with two candles.
